Madison's Clay Sapp

State FFA President's Year

Your Farmers Cooperative believes State FFA President, Clay Sapp, is destined to be a great leader. This handsome, energetic young man comes from a long line of agriculture folks. Both parents and grandparents farmed in Madison County for several years.

Clay learned a lot about farming from his family at an early age, and one of his fondest memories about the Cooperative was going there to get a cold RC cola drink. He also recalled seeing Mr. Johnny Davis always working so hard and Diane Williams getting just the right products they needed for their farm animals.

NOW AS A YOUNG adult he realizes how much community support Farmers Cooperative provides for Madison County.

Clay Sapp is a Madison High School graduate and the son of Ed and Gina Sapp in Madison.

Ed Sapp has been the Ag Teacher at Madison High School for 25 years. Gina is an Advanced Registered Nurse Practitioner in Perry, Florida. Clay is one of four siblings with two older brothers, Will and Blake, and a younger sister, Kimberly.

It's obvious Clay appreciates and enjoys all the opportunities that he has gained

from being a State FFA President. Keep in mind, it's not a position just handed to an individual because you get along well with others. It is work and sacrifice starting with putting everything else on hold for a year, except FFA, when you are selected State President.

The process begins with a detailed screening process in Haines City, Florida, and culminates with the results of the election process announced at the State Convention in Orlando. Initially, 31 candidates applied for the eight state officer positions. After two days of testing and interviews, the selection committee nominates two individuals for each of the six Area vice president positions. They also nominate two individuals for the office of president. After the nominations are announced the political campaigns begin.

First, nominees will create a letter that will introduce them to the nearly 500 voting delegates from FFA Chapters all over the state of Florida. Next they develop a business card that they will use to campaign with at the week long State Convention. At the convention they will have the opportunity to answer two impromptu questions in front of the voting delegates.

On the final day of the convention the results of the election are announced for each of the six Area vice presidents. The



results for president are announced with the runner-up automatically becoming State Secretary.

CLAY COMMENTS that having reached this honorable distinction of being chosen as a finalist for State President shows great strength and a feeling of gratitude for everyone that helped you along the way. Then comes the day of the announcement, and, yes, Clay Sapp, a North Florida individual has been named

Cabbage Winners

Growing With Farmers Cooperative is the theme used for this year's Cabbage Plant Growing Contest. When you see a third grader wearing one of our Cooperative T-shirts with the logo, "Growing With Farmers Cooperative" you'll know they spent a lot of time caring for their cabbage for the weigh in on Saturday, May 14th in Live Oak, and on May 21st at our Madison Co-op store.

Farmers Cooperative and Bonnie Plant teamed up again for their third Annual Cabbage Plant Growing Contest. The Cooperative Cabbage Program included all third grade classes at Suwannee Elementary School, Branford Elementary School, Madison County Central School, Greenville Elementary School, Lee Elementary School and Pinetta Elementary School.

General Manager, Todd Lawrence, Agronomy Division Manager, Barry Long, and Madison Manager Eddie Curl, delivered 800 plants to the various elementary schools in their area. Financial Secretary, Heather Kelley, and all the managers provided pizza parties for the winners.

In order for third graders to be eligible for the Bonnie Plant Farms Cabbage Contest, they simply had to plant the free Bonnie cabbage plant, provide the nutrients and attention the cabbage needed, and just watch it grow. Farmers Cooperative provided a small bag of fertilizer and a garden trowel free. Farmers Cooperative's website provided complete instructions on how to grow their Bonnie Plant cabbage.

We had a total of 23 class winners in the Cabbage Plant Growing Contest this year. Additionally, class winners will be entered into the State Bonnie Plant Farms drawing for a chance

to win a \$1,000 scholarship from Bonnie Plant Farms.

Our third grade gardeners learned responsibility along with a real sense of accomplishment to see how they can grow their own food. Children were encouraged to bring their cabbage to the weigh in regardless of the size or weight. In fact, they ranged from 29.90 pounds on down.

State FFA President for the year 2010 at the State Convention in Orlando, Florida.

It's an experience Clay will always treasure and has learned so much from the Area State Vice Presidents. Area 1, State Vice President, Lynsey Meharg; Area 2, State Vice President, Kaitlin Van Huesan; Area 3, State Vice President, Elise Stoddard; Area 4, State Vice President, Michelle Perez; Area 5, State Vice President, Nichole Liles; Area 6, State Vice President, Jillian Murphy and State Secretary, Valerie McKee.

"It's all pretty amazing with the talent of all these young ladies that I have been able to serve with and how much I have just been blessed and honored to be a part of the State FFA leadership team," Clay said. "It all seems just to be so much more than I feel that I deserve."

Clay added, "The screening process did prepare me to help build our team. Also, When you think of Florida's 15,000 FFA members — one of the largest student organizations in the State of Florida - and approximately 520,000 FFA members nationally, there's so much we could accomplish with all our outstanding human resources."

Clay's year as president has been a

very eventful one from learning about all the different crops Florida grows from Pensacola to Miami to cattle farming in Argentina.

"My year as State FFA President has been most exciting with the 10-day trip to Argentina in January 2011 where the temperature was about 10 degrees higher than Florida with extreme tropical humidity. The sight of Iguaza Falls, which are waterfalls of the Iguazu River near the City of Puerto Iguaza, are just breathtaking. The Devil's Throat with giant waterfalls cascading around you is an unbelievable picture, he said."

"These incredible waterfalls are up to 269 ft. in height and about 490 ft. by 2300 ft. wide. The only place you could think of comparing the water falls in North America is Niagara Falls with waterfalls that reach about 176 ft."

The Argentineans are passionate about their farming, especially with their beef cattle. However, their farmers are also struggling with the economy as well as the rest of the world. Clay stated. The steaks they served in the restaurant were just delicious. Clay recalls one evening when the FFA group went to a restaurant to eat, and the waiter brought about a 14-inch steak on the platter. Needless to say, two young men shared that steak.

"Argentine farmers believe grain fed beef is best and after eating steak for the 10 days we were there, we would tend to

agree with them," he added.

CLAY SAID HE had learned a lot about the global economy of agriculture this past year. For example, in the United States corn and soybean prices are affected by what happens in countries like Argentina. Just being able to network and see all the different types of farming, was an education in itself.

On June 17 when Clay Sapp turned over his gavel to the new State FFA President, he hoped all of his preparation helped him impart that he had done his best and that his audience felt he had earned the honor and distinction of being the best State President he could be because his experience has been one of a lifetime.

The future looks very bright for Clay. He plans to be able to get back to his hometown church, Hopewell Baptist Church in Madison, where he works with the College and Career Class. He has missed the uplifting he gets from his church. And this fall, he will be attending the University of Florida's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences and plans to major in agricultural education.

Once Clay completes that degree, he will pursue his master's degree in Educational Leadership, and then he may consider teaching Ag in Madison — like father, like son. Perhaps he may even think of corporate or agricultural law. We at Farmers Cooperative believe he is destined to be a great leader in whatever profession he chooses.
