Control High Heating Bills

Are you tired of trying to figure out how to pay the high heating bills in the winter? Then you may want to look at Farmers Cooperative Level Pay Plan. What is a Level Pay Plan you might ask? Well a Level Pay Plan iswhere Farmers Cooperative estimates your annual cost of your propane-heating bill and then equally divides it up so that you make the same payment each month.

Since this amount is only an estimate, the month of May is a month that the program ends and the balance is to be settled.

If your account has a credit balance, Farmers Cooperative will owe you money, which can either be applied to next year's Level Pay Plan or Farmers Cooperative will issue you a check for the credit balance. If you owe Farmers Cooperative then the balance is to be paid in full before the end of May.

The benefit of choosing the Level Pay Plan is that you avoid receiving and paying for a large heating bill in the middle of winter, usually near holidays, allowing you to better manage your household budget.

Janet's Cake

Due to limited space in our last newsletter, we were not able to include Brian McDonald's mother's recipe. With four young boys at home, Mrs. McDonald would bake four loaves of bread a day and a large cake quite often. Janet's cake was a family favorite.

1 1/2 cups sugar

1/4 lb. butter

2 tbsp. Crisco (3/4 cup altogether)

Cream shortening & sugar and add 2 eggs

Add to creamed mixture:

1/2 tsp. Allspice

1/2 tsp. Nutmeg

1/2 tsp. Ginger

1 tsp Cinnamon

2 tbsp Cocoa

1/2 box raisins (low boiled for 1 hr. and cooled)

1/2 cup raisin juice

When juice is lukewarm, add

1 tsp baking soda

2 cups flour

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 cup walnuts (chopped)

Makes 1 1/2 cake recipe. Bake 60 minutes @ 350° in large loaf pan.



Don't Take Chances

Clean, Safe Propane

Farmers Cooperative wants to educate and remind our customers about the safe use of propane.

Propane gas is a safe, efficient, and clean source of energy that is easily transportable to your location. Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services has determined that over 1/3 of all propane related accidents in Florida involve consumers attempting to repair or service their own appliances themselves or by unlicensed, untrained technicians.

THESE ACCIDENTS are occurring when gas appliances are removed from the premises and gas lines connecting these appliances are being left open. When the gas is turned on fires and explosions have resulted.

Florida law requires consumers and property owners to notify the gas dealer who next fills or services their propane equipment of any changes made to the propane system, especially when an appliance is removed. Failure to do so may result in serious injury, death or property damage. Safety is you responsibility.

If you smell gas you should follow these steps:

1. NO FLAMES OR SPARKS! This includes do not operate lights, appliances, telephones, or cell phones. Sparks from these sources can trigger an explosion or a fire.

- 2. LEAVE THE AREA IMMEDIATE-LY! Get out of the building or area that you suspect gas is leaking.
- 3. SHUT OFF THE GAS. Turn off the main gas supply on your propane tank if it is safe to do so. To close the valve, turn it to the right (clockwise).
- 4. REPORT THE LEAK. From an area away from the leak, contact Farmers Cooperative by calling the local store number 24 hours a day. Make sure that you leave a number that you can be reached at other than where the leak is suspected.
- 5. DO NOT RETURN TO THE AREA. Make sure that Farmers Cooperative or your local fire department has determined that it is safe to re-enter the area.
- 6. GET YOUR SYSTEM CHECKED. Do not use any propane appliances until Farmers Cooperative has done an entire system check to ensure that it is leak-free.

Since there is a possibility of odor fade or problems with your sense of smell, you should respond immediately to even a faint odor of gas. If you have any further questions about the safety of propane, Farmers Cooperative will be glad to answer them and provide safety brochures that you and your family can review.
